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## **Adult Guidance with Question Prompts**

Children describe the position and direction of images, objects and their own movements as they travel from different starting points. They learn to use the terms 'forwards', 'backwards', 'left' and 'right'. Here, children match each signpost with the correct direction label. They then check which set of directions will lead Red Riding Hood to Grandma's house, before creating directions of their own.

Which label matches each sign post?

Can you point to the left? Can you point to the right?

Look at where Little Red Riding Hood is standing.

Which directions should she follow to go to Grandma's?

Should she go left or right? Why?

What if she wanted to visit the woodcutter?

Can you direct her there? Is there another way?


Which way must she remember not to go?

## **Adult Guidance with Question Prompts**

Children describe the position and direction of images, objects and their own movements as they travel from different starting points. They learn to use the terms 'forwards', 'backwards', 'left' and 'right'. Children look at two statements about the three bears' home and then study the images to discover which are true or false. Next, children identify objects by reading descriptions of their positions. Children use this idea to create their own 'guess who' challenges.

Who does the cottage belong to? How can you tell?

What can you tell me about the rooms?

Read each statement. Are they true or false?

Can you show me why?

What can you do to check?

Each clue will lead you to a different object.

Can you show me how to find them?

Is there another way to describe the object's position?

Can you make your own clues for your friends to follow?

#### Adult-led activity:

Arrange a collection of toys. Take turns to describe the position of a toy for your friend to find.



Which way will you need to go to draw the other items?


