

Splitting up Speech

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If you are splitting a single sentence, you shouldn't use a capital letter to continue after the reporting clause.

"I think," Joe said slowly, "you left the map outside."

However, if you are splitting more than one sentence, you should use a capital letter for the part of the speech that comes after the reporting clause.

"I can't have!" Sylvie shouted. "I was so careful with it!"
